COURSE OVERVIEW

This course is designed for line supervisors and administrators responsible for overseeing field training units. It focuses on preparing Field Training Managers (FTM) and Field Training Coordinators (FTC) to effectively coordinate, administrate, and lead field training programs. Topics include the San Jose Model FTO Program, the duties of the FTM and FTC, leadership in field training, methods to correct poor performance, reviewing the DOR, using the Weekly Managers Report, managing and selecting FTOs, and addressing legal issues related to field training programs.

Supervising and Managing the FTO Unit

Mike Heisinger is the former Chief of Police for the Tularosa Police Department in Southern New Mexico, where he oversaw a team of 6 officers, 4 dispatchers, and 3 animal control officers. He began his law enforcement career as a Sheriff's Deputy in Johnson County, Indiana, where he held various roles, including Narcotics Detective, SWAT team member, Motor Officer, and Patrol Officer. Mike also served as an instructor for reserve school courses and as a Field Training Officer for reserves and new officers. After retiring from Johnson County, he joined the University of Indianapolis Police Department as a Detective, SWAT team leader, and FTO Coordinator. Mike later moved to Alamogordo, New Mexico, where he worked for two years before assuming the position of Chief of Police in Tularosa.

Course Objectives:

This class is designed for the line supervisors and administrators assigned the responsibility of overseeing a field training unit. One of the key elements of success in a field training program is program management. Often programs will train the FTO but fail to prepare the supervisor for the variety of tasks required to properly coordinate, administrate, and lead the field training unit. This course will prepare the Field Training Manger (FTM) and Field Training Coordinator (FTC) for the requirements of their positions.
